JULIE'S STORY

On the feast of Candlemas 1804, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, Julie, Françoise and a young woman called Catherine Duchatel made or renewed their vows of chastity and promised, under the patronage of Our Lady, to devote their lives to the Christian instruction of girls. They also undertook to train teachers of religion who would go wherever they were needed. With the words of Simeon's prophecy echoing in their hearts, the three women promised to dedicate their lives so that others would come to know Christ, the light of the world. It was an appropriate feast for the Birthday of the Congregation.

The feast of Candlemas was once more significant in Julie's life. Two years after the birth of the Congregation, Julie and her Sisters were reflecting on the prayer of Simeon when Julie was seen to rise in ecstasy, her face radiant. Tradition believes that God showed her that one day her Sisters would go throughout the world carrying the light of Christ to those still in darkness.

REFLECTION

February 2nd, feast of Candlemas, feast of light is the birth-day of the Congregation of the Sisters of Notre Dame. The poet, Mary Oliver, suggests in one of her poems that "you too have come into this world to...be filled with light, and to shine." St Julie shone with God's goodness and saw that goodness all around her. Take some time now to consider the gifts God has given you – life, sight, hearing, appreciation of beauty, friendship etc. Ponder how these gifts fill you with Light and be amazed at how you shine.

Even in times of darkness and isolation, how have you witnessed God's light shining through? How have you been God's light to our residents and patients during this time?
