
2022 EDUCATIONAL FORUM

Residents Play a Role in Facility Health and Safety



Pedi Pals Team Partners with the Campaign for Pediatric Home Nursing

The Notre Dame Pediatric Palliative Care team (Pedi Pals) has joined with an emerging parent group, the Campaign for Pediatric Home Nursing, to improve the availability and quality of skilled nursing to support medically fragile children living in ICU conditions at home. Campaign representatives are meeting with elected officials and candidates for statewide office to generate awareness that the current state policies only fill 62% of the nursing hours allocated which is resulting in unsafe homecare, caregiver burnout, loss of careers and other unintended negative consequences. To date, the Campaign has conducted listening sessions and is forming relationships with members of the American Academy of Pediatrics Home Care Committee, the Federation for Children with Special Needs, Boston Children's Hospital Complex Care and Health Care for All.

Educational Bridge Center Happenings

Welcome Back to In-Person Learning at our Educational Bridge Center! In May, the Educational Bridge Center began hosting live, in-person classes again. The sounds of excited students have been missing in the Center since March 13, 2020 when the doors were closed because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Though we were unable to participate in face-to-face learning, we never wavered in our commitment to our educational mission.

Workforce development services such as career coaching and scholarship assistance never stopped. Our Adult Basic Education classes—HiSET Preparation, and English for the Workplace—went to an online format.

Our Sister Helen Wright Citizenship Program's services also continued with the help of our dedicated tutors. These Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur worked with students using a variety of online platforms such as ZOOM and WhatsApp. These virtual connections continued to provide excellent education as well as the individual support needed to build the confidence of our immigrant students. We are beyond thrilled to welcome students back, in-person beginning with our Summer Session classes. "The Notre Dame Difference," while cer-



tainly available online, really shines when we

are all face-to-face. And we will continue to monitor the best ways to engage with our students, which may include some additional online programming, or hybrid education as we go forward. All students attending in-person learning must provide proof of full vaccination against COVID-19.

In addition, Notre Dame Health Care is demonstrating its support and concern for employees' education by ensuring they are compensated for their wages while they are in class. This alleviates one of the difficulties that result in staff being unable to attend these programs. Community students are certainly welcome if they meet the necessary vaccination requirements.
